Potter Lake Dam

We have a new dam! It has been fascinating to watch the process. Ayers (consulting, design and engineering) and CW Purpero (construction) met with us on October 7, 2024 to explain the operation and maintenance, and signed off on the project. Thank you to everyone for your support. The dam will maintain Potter Lake at proper water levels for years to come. This edition of the newsletter shows the change from old to new!

PLPRD Updates

The Annual Meeting of the Potters Lake Protection and Rehabilitation District was held on September 11, 2024. All board members were present, as well as 25 constituents.

The 2025 budget was approved by the homeowners. The electors also approved to dissolve and move away from our bylaws to solely operate under Wisconsin State Statute, Chapter 33 and other state laws with added policies and procedures. Links to Chapter 33, policies and procedures, and resolutions will be accessible on the webpage.

Lake and Pond Solutions, LLC sampled water from Potter Lake three times this summer. The summary of the data shows that the water quality and clarity of Potter Lake does not appear to have changed much from previous years, with the exception of the Chlorophyll a, which was quite high in August. This is probably due to the higher rainfall and heat during this time. During the discussion of the lake conditions, the subject of zebra mussels came up, with many wondering if anything can be done about this invasive species. As you can read in this information from the [DNR on Zebra Mussels](#), once zebra mussels have entered a water body, there is little that can be done to control them.
